History of Community & School by Steve Flores

The history of Costilla dates back to 1872. It was a settlement established by people of Spanish descent. Throughout its history, the economy of Costilla has been tied to farming and ranching. The name Costilla comes from the creek that flows through the town. At one time, the community had about 1,000 residents with four separate plazas. Today the town is known as the gateway to Valle Vidal, one of New Mexico's most beautiful areas, with its high mountains, green valleys, creeks, and rivers. The town of Costilla today has just 200 residents and a couple of stores, a gas station, and a bed-and-breakfast.

In the fall of 1965, the Costilla school was consolidated with Questa. Students attend elementary school in Costilla and go to Questa for Middle and High School.
