History of Community & School by Steve Flores

In 1867, prospectors found goldfloat in the area. By 1879, the town of Hillsboro was established. Jackie Yankie made one of the largest finds in the area. To honor Yankie, prospectors allowed him to choose the name of the mining camp. Yankie chose Hillsborough, for his native town of Hillsborough, Ohio. This was later shortened to Hillsboro. The town grew to one of the larger towns in the area. Over \$6,000,000 of gold was discovered in the late 1800's. In 1882, Hillsboro was named the seat of Sierra County. When the mining faded, the town lost the county seat to Hot Springs. Today the town survives mainly from tourism. Several interesting stores remain open year around. The town still has a post office and a historic business district. About 100 people live in the area.

Hillsboro High School and its gymnasium are in very good condition, even though the school has been closed for almost 70 years. The school was placed on the National Register of Historic Places and is now used as a Community Center.
