History of the Community and School by Steve Flores

The town of Hollene has a history that dates back to the early 1900's. The town was settled not only by homesteaders, but also by people who bought land from real estate companies. One of the developers of the area was a man named John T. Thompson. The town was named after his daughter, Hollene. Hollene was a booming town between 1909 and 1935. It had several merchantile stores, a lumberyard, grocery store, a post office, and several other stores. The depression and the drought of the 1930's hurt the farming and ranching economy and many people started moving out to find work in the cities. Today there is no sign of life in the town. To get to the site of the former town, you have to travel on a dirt road, by a beautiful cemetery where people are still being buried today. Hollene school had a gym built during the 1935-1936 school year by the WPA. No traces of the gym were found but I was told it was moved to Claud and used as a middle school gym for several years. It is now a private residence.
